PASTOR'S REFLECTIONS

I'm not sure exactly when it was when someone told me they had seen a Christmas display up in one of the stores but it was way before Halloween, I know that. When we were back at my mother's at the beginning of November, many of the ads on Boston TV were Christmas ads. By the time we got back to Ishpeming on the 10th of November, the Christmas decorations on the light poles around town were in place

and lit. I don't bemoan all that anymore; it does start way too early, and it does become excessive, but the secular, consumer aspects of Christmas have their good points that we all enjoy in some fashion and they shouldn't hinder anyone's religious observance of Christmas as the Nativity of our Lord.

Christmas does inevitably sneaks into some of what we do at church during the month of December; we're not immune to the culture so it's hard to be liturgical purists and eschew all things Christmas until Christmas Eve. Even though Christmas sneaks in, we mark time a little bit differently as we observe the season of Advent, the four Sunday's before Christmas. We observe Advent musically, holding off on Christmas carols until Christmas Eve and we do it liturgically with the lighting of the Advent wreath each week.

During these weeks the amount of daylight is gradually decreasing, the already short days get shorter still. On our Advent wreath though, each week the light increases with the lighting of another candle as we anticipate the arrival of Jesus, the Light of the World. There's a simplicity to it, but I find the lighting of the Advent wreath to be one of the more moving liturgical acts of the church year; it seems to have a way of slowing down the rush to Christmas.



Somewhat harder to fight is the sense that Christmas is over on December 25th. For many it seems anticlimactic to observe the 12 Days of Christmas and continue to sing Christmas hymns and carols on the two Sundays after Christmas when the cultural celebration is over. For most people Epiphany on January 6th which culminates the twelve days, isn't on their radar. Even in most churches, if Epiphany is observed at all, it's on the Sunday after.

The approach of our Worship and Music committee for the past few years though, has been that worship should be the central activity of any church. With that in mind we decided that we would observe the church year and its festivals as fully as possible.

So we offer worship services on Christmas Day even when it falls on a Saturday and there were two services on Friday, Christmas Eve and another to come on Sunday the 26th. We will have a service on January 6th to celebrate Epiphany. We do this hoping that people will come and that they will gain a fuller appreciation of the cycle and festivals of the church year, but we do it mostly because that's what we should do as a church.

Please note the full schedule of services for Advent, Christmas and Epiphany found below in the Outlook. Plan to be part of as many as you can; there is something special about each of them. After all, besides being the primary activity of any church, worship should also be the primary activity of any church member.

May these seasons and services be a special and meaningful part of your journey!

Sunday School Program December 12 during 10:30 Worship Service

On December 12, Bethany's Sunday School will present a special Christmas concert and Santa Lucia procession during worship as part of our church's 140th anniversary. Christina Mariani will take the part of Lucia, and other Sunday School students will accompany her into the sanctuary.

After worship, instead of the traditional Advent dinner, the Sunday School students will serve Lucia buns and host an expanded coffee hour including Swedish Christmas cookies*, sausage and cheese.

Lucia Day, or Luciadagen, is celebrated in Sweden on December 13, and is one of the festivals of light that mark the long nights of winter in northern countries. Lucia herself was a Sicilian Christian who was martyred for her faith in 304 A.D. Her story became significant in Sweden during the Middle Ages, when stories were told of a young woman robed in white with a wreath of candles on her head who appeared and gave gifts of food during a famine. In the late 19th century, the custom of the oldest girl in the family dressing up as Lucia and bringing saffron buns and coffee to her parents developed, and Luciadagen became part of the celebrations of the Christmas season.

Bakers are asked to bring a dozen Christmas cookies to share.

The Santa Lucia Legend

History of Lucia

According to legend, Lucia was a medieval saint who carried food and drink to hungry folk in the province of Värmland during a period of famine. She was seen across Lake Vänern with her white gown and crown of lights. Today's costume has the same gown and crown. The Lucia legend is said to have originated in Syracuse on the island of Sicily. A young girl, about to be a bride, gave her entire dowry to the poor of her village and admitted that she had become a Christian. She was accused of witchcraft and burned at the stake on December 13, 304 A.D.

Much later in history, the early Church made a saint out of her - Santa (Saint) Lucia. Italian artists sometimes picture her as a blind girl holding a lamp. She is a patron saint for Italian fishermen and she is said to help guide them home through the rough seas during a storm.

There are many legends about her and in each one Lucia stands as a symbol of light and hope to all mankind. Santa Lucia's coming begins the feasting, merriment, singing and the spirit of friendliness and goodwill that lasts all through the holidays.

How we celebrate Lucia in Sweden

In Sweden, the Lucia Day is celebrated all over the country in every home, school, and workplace on the morning of the 13th of December. All of the other Scandinavian countries (Denmark, Finland, Iceland, and Norway) celebrate Lucia as well. In each home usually the eldest daughter dresses in a white gown with a red sash and a crown of candles. She and her sisters wake the family at dawn and serve them a breakfast of sun-colored saffron buns and gingerbread cookies. At each school, there is a gathering in the auditorium or gym first thing in the morning. The lights are dimmed and the Lucia and Lucia maids enter, singing the old song "Santa Lucia".



At every workplace they make time for a special morning "coffee break" before the day even starts and a few ladies dress up as Lucias. At most public institutions, a table is laid ready with coffee, saffron buns and gingerbread cookies for the public to enjoy all that day. On this day, as well as around Christmas, a hot mulled drink called glögg is served. Lucia brings a message of lighter times to come during the darkest time of the year. It is a very festive atmosphere, full of good feelings, hope, and expectations.

At Lucia Scandinavians usually bake cookies and bread to have with the "Lucia coffee".

Here is a saffron bread recipe:

Lussebullar or Lussekatter Saffron Bread

· 1 tbsp saffron

· 2 cups milk

· 3 tbsp yeast (quick rise)

· 1 cup butter or margarine

· 1 egg (beaten)

· ½ tsp salt

· 1½ cups sugar

· ½ cup chopped almonds

· 1 cup raisins (optional)

· 6-7 cups flour

Topping

· 1 beaten egg

· coarse sugar

· chopped almonds

· raisins

Crush saffron and mix with a tbsp of sugar in a mortar. Warm the milk (not too hot) and melt the butter in the milk. Add the rest of the ingredients except for the yeast and flour. Mix the yeast in a separate bowl with a little of the flour. Add to mixture and mix well. Add the rest of the flour a little at a time. Knead and let rise in a warm place. Once risen, punch down and knead again. Roll the dough to whatever shape(s) you prefer. Place on a cookie sheet, raise, brush with egg and sprinkle with coarse sugar, almonds, and raisins. Bake "small shapes" in a very hot oven at 375-400°F for 5 to 8 minutes and bake "larger shapes" at 350-375°F for 13 to 17 minutes.

Scandinavian Almond Cake

Spray pan with Pam or cooking spray

Beat well: 1 1/4 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1 1/2 teaspoons pure almond extract,

2/3 cup milk

Add: 1 1/4 cup flour, 1/2 teaspoon baking powder

Add: 1 stick melted margarine

Mix well.

Bake at 350° for 40—50 minutes. Edges must be golden brown. Cool in pan before removing. Cake will break if removed too soon. Sprinkle with confectionary sugar.

Variation: Before pouring batter into the pan, sprinkle sliced almonds

on the bottom.

Ann Gonyea-Alexander Answers the Call

I think to understand this sense of call I am feeling at 46 years of age and 20-plus years into my present career, I have to go back to the beginning. Once upon a time, I was the quintessential little Irish-Catholic girl torn between wanting to be a mom and a nun.

When I was 12, while I was walking down a Chicago beach with a woman named Ethel Polk, I made a decision about that dilemma. Ethel was an important caring adult in my life; she was outside the circle of my immediate family and had my best interests in mind. So I took her opinions and observations to heart. Ethel is now in her 90s. When she was younger she became a very accomplished woman. She broke through a lot of glass ceiling during her career as a union organizer for women in the U.S. textile industry and a strong voice in Illinois labor. Even as a child I had instinctual understandings of just how much she bucked the system. I had lunch with her in January of 2009. She leaned into me and said "Do you know what I consider one of the most important accomplishments of my life?" With all she had done I couldn't imagine what that could be. She said "That day we were walking down the beach and I talked you out of being a nun."

I was stunned. Truthfully, I had forgotten about the conversation. It was good advice. I do not believe I was meant to be a nun – and I think it's safe to say my husband and children would agree. But Ethel's reminder brought those memories forward at a time when I was really questioning where I was in my life and what I was going to do about being continually under-satisfied with where my career had taken me.

In my present job I have concentrated on nonprofit management and youth development, as understood through the research of Search Institute in Minneapolis. One Search focus of late is something called Sparks – those things that children exhibit a high aptitude for or interest in at an early age. Sparks are innate passions; they come from the gut. So I was thinking about my own Sparks when Ethel revealed this accomplishment. Ethel's comment brought to mind a Spark that likely predates my

love of writing. When I was that little quintessential Irish-Catholic girl I was truly moved by Jesus Christ. I don't think I knew exactly why or how to express it at that age, but in retrospect I would say it was Christ's message that we are loved unconditionally by God, and his examples of how we should respond to that love and the suffering he endured for me and everyone I saw around me.



The 1970s were not easy for my family, my mother in particular. She was raising me and my sister and brother on her own. The economy was poor at that time too. There were times when we didn't have enough to eat. We sometimes lived in dangerous places. The only recourse I had was to pray. That's what my mother taught me. The strength of her faith in God has been inspirational throughout my life. Somehow we made it through whatever the challenge *du jour* was and I knew it must be due to God along with the hard work of my mother.

To provide context, I should add that my personal journey from my Catholic beginnings to my present day worship with my Lutheran brothers and sisters was a rocky one full of lessons and many years away from any church. For a lot of complex reasons, I did fall away from the Catholic Church. It broke my heart.

Then in the early 1990s that void began to be filled when our good friend Keenan Tunnell invited us to Easter worship at Bethany and began to worship here regularly. Bethany appealed to me because the liturgy was familiar and I was welcome – me and all my faults and sins and baggage. It was wonderful. It felt like home almost immediately. It was also a Christian community in which my father was welcome during his final days. That was a great comfort to him. My worship and involvement at Bethany in those days was spotty, but the seed was planted. When my family left the Upper Peninsula to move downstate in 1995, we again fell away from attending worship regularly and for 10 years the feeling I was missing something mounted – this time even more pointedly. For instance, Easter became a painful experience for me. Like most American children, mine wanted to celebrate Easter with egg hunts, jelly beans and baskets, all the Easter you can conveniently purchase at the store. But it felt like a fraud to me. We weren't celebrating Easter because it didn't have anything to do with Jesus Christ. I compromised and agreed to celebrate the arrival of spring. But if we weren't observing Lent and celebrating the resurrection of Christ, we weren't going to call it Easter.

When we moved back to the Upper Peninsula in 2005 we started attending Bethany again. This time being part of this Lutheran community has resonated even more strongly with me. I love that I am invited to read and interpret the Bible in the context of my life and the times in which we live. From the perspective of being a former Catholic and an observer of the world around me, I am drawn to Martin Luther's theology and the concept that "faith alone saves, and that works and external things avail nothing." My involvement at Bethany and beyond !has gotten progressively deeper and richer.



And so I find myself today emotionally committed to attending the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago. I am fully aware that it will not be easy – there are a lot of details to tackle. I have spoken to people in my community and at the seminary about the possibility of coming back to the U.P. as a pastor and find that idea very exciting. But I also feel strongly that I have to approach my call with an open and listening heart and go where God leads me.

I want my life's work to go beyond the mission-driven work I do now to the ultimate mission-driven work of helping people turn to God, study Jesus' ministry for guidance of how to walk our own lives, and feel awed and inspired by Jesus' sacrifice for us. I want to do this work in this world where so many people have never heard Christ's message and too many of those who have think you have to jump through certain hoops or meet certain human-made criterion to earn God's grace. As an ELCA Lutheran I am struck that we have this wonderfully liberating message to offer about God's grace through faith alone, but we are so reluctant to share this news. I think I innately respond to that challenge and that mission.



New Books December and January



New for Christmas: The Cradle to Cross Trilogy

Book One: Bozra. FIC MCC.1

Bozra, a shepherd boy, sleeps through an historic event - angels announcing the birth of the Messiah in Bethlehem. He meets kings seeking this Messiah. He hears of another king who orders a massacre of the babies in his home town. He wonders will he ever meet this man named Yeshua. ... Bozra lived at a time unlike most others. A time prophets dreamed of. A time immersed in danger and intrigue. A time of change.

Book Two: Hadad. FIC MCC.2

Here's the inside Christmas story from the innkeeper himself who prefers to be known as the world's best barkeep. When the dusty traveler, a broken-down donkey and a very pregnant woman show up in the middle of the night, Hadad wonders why he has to deal with their problems in the first place. He's not interested in a crying kid and shows them the barn, little more than a hole in the hill. But the next morning something draws him to the family and Hadad begins an unexpected fondness for this baby boy. He panics for his life when Herod's terrorists begin their slaughter and hopes to warn the family only to discover they escaped in the night.

Book Three: Joseph. FIC MCC.3

Joseph, perhaps the most overlooked and yet most famous father of all time, gets shocking news that changes the course of history and blasts his beliefs. He knows this child is not his. Can't be. He hasn't touched her....Mary should be a blushing bride, not the town's gossip. Joe's reaction may surprise you, maybe not. And that is just the beginning. The law allows him to turn her in and have her stoned. He considers his options. She's beginning to show. Everyone will know. He will be the laughing stock unless he divorces her, turning his back on the shame. But - he loves her. His heart is broken, but aches to hold her and make everything all right again. Only a miracle could save him, them.

Social Ministry Update December 2010—January 2011

Suggested items for the Care package are: toiletry items, shampoo, lip gloss, hand cream, handi-wipes, small nut packages, cookies (no chocolate), hard candies, granola bars, single "Little Debbie" items, sunscreen etc. Travel sizes are preferred. Please no hotel sample items. Also small books, games, new deck of cards or like items are suggested. This package will be shipped out on December 3.

We received a request from **Lutheran Social Services** to participate in **Operation Christmas.** They suggested we find a service in our area, which we might support. For the Christmas Season 2010 Bethany's Social Ministry Board would like to support **Hillcrest.** This is a group home in Ishpeming, for adults with developmental disabilities, currently serving 6 women. Items they would like to receive are: gift cards to Shopko, Wal-Mart, Target, Pamida or the Country Village Theater, McDonalds, Burger King, Beef-A-Roo; CD's of Oldies, easy listening, Christmas, pop, (all but RAP); DVD's for family viewing, cartoons; toiletries of all kinds – shampoo, cream rinse, bath soap or gel, body sprays, deodorant/antiperspirant, combs, brushes, toothpaste, disposable razors, body lotion, finger nail and toe nail clippers, powder, nail polish, nail polish remover, adult wet wipes, sippy cups, any kind of VCR or DVD player, bath towels, wash cloths, glasses, dish towels, food grinder and any kind of socks for women. We have a collection box for any of the above items for **Hillcrest** in the Narthex.

LAY SCHOOL NEWS

- The Winter Semester is set to begin on January 18th and will continue every Tuesday until April 5th...
- Classes will be held at Bethany, Ishpeming (715 Mather Ave.) with Pastor Warren Geier as the site coordinator.

Five classes will be offered in the Winter 2011 semester (**Please note the dates and times for each class as they do vary.**)

Systematics Second Article January 18-February 15 (3-5:10 pm) (5 sessions) A study of the second article of the Nicene Creed concerning who and what is Jesus, and what is it about the human condition that necessitates Christ and the cross? What are the historical foundations, especially regarding the nature of Christ? (Pastor Peter Anderson; Messiah, Marquette)

Pentateuch January 18-February 22 (6-8 pm) (6 sessions)

A study of the first five books of the Old Testament. The stories of the Pentateuch will be examined, not merely as history, but as theological statements, and the legal material will be considered in light of our contemporary culture.

(Pastor Warren Geier; Bethany, Ishpeming)

Ethics February 22-March 8 (3-5 pm) (3 sessions)

A brief course on ethical behavior in light of the cross and God's call to righteousness. (Pastor Jim Duehring; Prince of Peace, Harvey)



Overview of Ministry in the Congregation March 1-April 5 (6-8:40pm) (6 sessions)

This class will take a quick overview of a number of congregational ministries including education, stewardship, social minis-

try, youth ministry, and other ministries that are routinely a part of congregational life. The course will introduce students to resources available in each area of ministry. (TBA)

Spiritual Development March 15-April 5 (3-5:15) (4 sessions)

An exploration of spiritual practices, especially prayer, and how as we develop them they develop us in our faith journey. There will be an emphasis on learning and doing spiritual practices, not just learning about them. (TBA)

A reminder that there is no tuition; the only cost is for books (and instructors do the best they can to keep that within reason.)

As is always the case, we need new students! It should be emphasized though that one does not have to sign up for all the classes, one does not have to complete all the classes in a certain period of time, one does not even have to complete all the classes ever. You can take as much or as little as works for your schedule and your interests. The program is designed to be flexible. Also, Lay School is not designed to produce Licensed Lay Ministers. While that is a possibility and some graduates have gone in that direction, most students are just interested in growing in faith and becoming more active in their own congregations.

To register for classes, or if you have specific questions, contact your pastor or Pastor Geier (486-4351; pastor@bethanyishpeming.org). It helps to have a ballpark number of students so that books can be ordered. If you would like more detailed information on any of the classes contact Pastor Geier.

It would be great to have some new students give Lay School a try, so consider this a personal invitation! If you're not sure, try a course and see how it goes. You will grow in faith and you and your church will benefit from your involvement!
