

PASTOR'S REFLECTIONS

Three feet of snow in the middle of November has a way of throwing off one's seasonal equilibrium. We're used to snow in November around here, that's nothing new, but the refrain I've heard from many is "Too much, too soon." One of the things the abundance of snow did to me was to make me

start looking for Christmas lights. With all the snow it seemed like there should be more of them but then I'd catch myself as I realized it's only November 13th or 14th; it's too early. It threw me off though; it almost seemed like it was OK for the Hallmark channel to be showing Christmas movies (mostly bad Christmas movies) throughout the month of November!



With the First Sunday of Advent on November 30th we do move into the Christmas cycle of seasons. As always during December, we wind up pulled between the church's observation of Advent and the pre-Christmas activities of the wider culture although in reality, pre-Christmas activities also work their way into the church. In the past I've written about how we do better if we just acknowledge that in many ways we're talking about two separate celebrations, one religious and one secular or commercial and leave it at that. In a way that's true, they are separate, but for most of us the two are quite intertwined. Aspects of sacred Christmas impact aspects of secular Christmas and vice-versa and at its best, it makes the time even more enjoyable.



Obviously, from my perspective, the observance of Advent as Advent is important. Marking the time with weekly lighting of the Advent wreath represents one of our richest rituals, emphasizing as it does the themes of waiting and watching in hope. Equally important, of course, is hearing the Christmas story again, not just the familiar birth narrative on Christmas Eve but also other aspects of the Incarnation as we move from the end of Advent

through the days of Christmas and into Epiphany and the Sundays after Epiphany. During that time we learn more about the identity of the baby whose birth we celebrate on Christmas.

All of that is important, but it doesn't mean that we can't participate in and enjoy the secular side of the season with the joy and good will it brings. What's sad is when it's only the crassest, most commercial aspects of the season that are celebrated and I fear that for more and more people, especially children, that's the case; Christmas is about shopping and presents and that's it. We probably can't change that except in small ways as in our lives and in our worship we continue to witness to the fact that there *is* more.

You will find the schedule of worship services below and on the card included in this issue of the Outlook. One thing to note is that the late service on Christmas Eve won't be quite so late this year, beginning at 10 o'clock rather than 11.

A blessed Advent and a Merry Christmas to all!

LAY SCHOOL—WINTER CLASSES

Gospels

Worship and Liturgics

This class will focus less on leading worship and more on understanding the symbols we use, the church calendar, and the liturgical structure of worship.

World Religions

An examination of the essentials of the Christian faith and then a comparison with other religions of the world including Judaism, Islam and Buddhism.

Evangelism

A course that will explore how sharing the good news is part of discipleship. How can evangelism be done, both as an individual discipline and as part of the life of the community? How can we see evangelism as a natural part of discipleship and not something scary or bizarre?

No Christmas song is more loved than this tender children's carol. With its simply worded expression of love for the Lord Jesus and trust in His faithful care, the hymn appeals to young and old alike. It is usually one of the first Christmas songs learned in early childhood; yet its pleasing melody and gentle message preserve it in our affections all through life.

For some time "Away in the Manger" was titled "Luther's Cradle Hymn." It was thought to have been written by Martin Luther for his own children and then passed on by German mothers. Modern research discounts this claim, however. Stanzas one and two first appeared in the *Little Children's Book*, published in Philadelphia in 1885. The third verse was written by a Methodist minister, John T. McFarland, in the early 1900s when an additional stanza for this carol was desired for use at a church children's day program.

How important it is that we take time to help our children see beyond the glitter of the Christmas season and teach them the true meaning of Christ's birth. The most thrilling story ever know to man began in Bethlehem at Christmas.

A Season for Giving

Many people, including our congregation, give all year long. Our food table seems to magically fill each week. It isn't magic. It is God's people doing God's work. The need for food is a constant nationally and locally.

In the November LUTHERAN magazine one article shared this information: "One in seven Americans (46 million people) rely on food pantries and meal service programs, according to a study by Feeding America, a network of 200 food banks. And 25 percent of military families, 620,000 households, need help putting food on the table."



And more locally, Kenneth Estelle, CEO of our Ishpeming Feeding America Food Bank stated, "During 2013, the CUP distributed over 869,000 pounds of food to its 82 agencies in the Upper Peninsula which amounts to well over a half million meals." He adds, "...we sill be striving to exceed that amount again this year."

During this season of giving many people think about helping others:

- --It may be as simple as putting loose change/dollars in the Salvation Army bell ringer's bucket.
- --Or picking up a few extra items at the grocery store for the food table.
- --Or providing a home cooked meal or cookies or a fruit basket for a family.
- --Or donating to the many groups collecting food, toys, and clothing for the needy. The opportunities are endless.

Another way of giving does not require money. It is giving the gift of time. This gift is very special since our time is finite—when we give time, we can never get it back. Giving the gift of time may include:

- --Visiting shut-ins or people in nursing facilities.
- -- Using your musical talents to entertain at nursing facilities.
- -- Donating time to be a bell ringer.
- --Donating time to facilities that rely on volunteers to help carry out their charity work. For example, Feeding America uses volunteers.
- -- Donating time to shovel snow or do other jobs for those who cannot do it themselves.
- --And last, just greeting people with a smile and a kind word.


Again the possibilities are endless. We all have different gifts to share with others. Use your gifts to bring hope, comfort, and happiness to others now and throughout the new year.

Stained Glass Installed



Thank you Dan Argall for giving your talent to Bethany in this stunning addition to the sanctuary.

Early in November the stained glass window designed and made by Dan Argall was installed in the sanctuary. The installation of the window was done by Champion Glass who were honored to be involved in this project.

Dan credits Keenan Tunnell for the inspiration for the design. Dan began work on the window a year ago. During the process, Dan incorporated salvaged pieces of glass from Bethany's old church on Division Street.

Tom Ryan stepped in to complete the frame after Dan injured his finger while working on the final framing.

Dan donated over 1000 hours of time in the creation of this window. The cost of the project was approximately \$6000. Three thousand dollars went for the new thermal pane window, and three thousand was used for the stained glass window.

Work is presently underway for a second stained glass window with an angel motif.

ROOM AT THE INN HOMELESS SHELTER

Luke 2 says that Jesus was laid in a manger when he was born because there was no room in the inn for Mary and Joseph. For approximately twenty people who are needing shelter in the Marquette area at any given time, there is room in the inn.

Room At The Inn homeless shelter began operation seven years ago. It came about because a lady by the name of Helen McCormick had a conversation with a homeless person who was living in a tent in February in Marquette. She was so moved by that conversation that she felt she had to try to do something to alleviate the homeless problem in our area.

She began by writing letters to churches in Marquette asking if any would be interested in getting involved. She received positive responses from five churches. I talked with Lois Stanley, whose church was one of the those first five. She told me that she had wanted to be involved with the homeless since her college years but the right opportunity had not presented itself. She was very excited to become a part of what would become Room At The Inn.



The shelter has grown; there are now eleven churches actually housing the homeless guests. Each church takes a week at a time. The week begins with the evening meal on Sunday and ends on the following Sunday when the guests leave in the morning. The shelter's daily hours are 6 PM to 6 AM. A meal is served each night by people from the host church or others who have volunteered to

prepare a meal. The entire shelter must be moved to a different host church each Sunday.

This year has seen the addition of a warming center in downtown Marquette. It opens at 6 AM and volunteers serve breakfast each morning from 6-8 for Room At The Inn's guests. The warming center then opens its doors to everyone who needs a breakfast and/or a place to get warm. The goal of the warming center is to be open daily from 6 AM - 6 PM. There are not enough volunteers at present to do that; right now the center is open after 10 AM based on the number of volunteers available for that day.

Room At The Inn is staffed entirely by volunteers except for one paid staff member, a social worker whose title is "Client Advocate". This person works with the guests, attempting to address whatever issues have resulted in their homelessness. The stories are many and varied. There is a board of directors and an executive director who handle questions and problems that arise concerning the operation of the shelter.

Opportunities for volunteers are many. As mentioned earlier, an evening meal is provided daily. This can be a hardship for very small churches. Sometimes individual families, a small group of friends or churches who do not actually house guests will volunteer to provide a meal. For example, the Assembly of God Church in Ishpeming and the United Methodist Church in Republic are two that I know of who do this. Each night at the Shelter is divided into three shifts – 6 PM – 10 PM, 10 PM –



2 AM and 2 AM - 6 AM. Each of these shifts is staffed by a male and a female. These people need to be trained and there is a training session on the third Thursday of each month at the warming center. Volunteers are also needed to move the shelter each Sunday, to do laundry, to provide breakfast and to staff the warming center during the day.



Donations are always needed for both the shelter and the warming center. Money is probably the greatest need but Lois did tell me that socks are always needed. They do like to keep a few coats on hand (new or gently used) because some people don't have anything that is warm enough. To donate time or resources, call 227-9171.

I became involved with Room At The Inn because I felt a little nudge when I first read about it in the newspaper. That told me I needed to do this. I always think of Room At The Inn when I hear someone wondering what one person can do. Room At The Inn is the result of one person who saw a need and took action!!

In conclusion, I'd like to share a poem written by a homeless teen:

Learn to listen like a teddy bear,
With ears open and mouth closed tight.
Learn to forgive like a teddy bear,
With an open heart, not caring who is right.



Learn to love like a teddy bear,
With arms open and imperfect eyesight.
Do not ask for your life's load lightened,
But for courage to endure.
Do not ask for fulfillment in all your life,
Do not ask for perfection in all you do,
But for the wisdom not to repeat mistakes.
And finally, do not ask for more,
Before saying, "Thank you,"
For what you have already received.
If you're looking for somebody to blame
Look in the mirror.
There is no challenge that cannot be met,

There are no new titles for this month and next. We'll be buying some of the sale books from the profits, but they won't be available until next Christmas, since they're all Christmas titles. Nevertheless, there WILL be a major display of Christmas titles throughout December and January (plus Epiphany titles in January), so be sure to check out the library kiosk.

I'd also like to ask Library users to check around their homes for any books they have yet to return. I know how easy it is to put aside something you've finished or decided NOT to finish. I have quite a stack of unreturned books and videos from over the past several years. Feel guilty?? Have a look around your home and see what comes up! I'd appreciate being able to see some of these items again!

In lieu of book titles this month, I'd like to harken back to the "we are surrounded" theme to bring your attention to some of the capital "S" saints whose days occur over the next two months:

Of course you are all familiar with St. Nicholas (6 December)...he who has morphed into Santa Claus; but his message of gift-giving and helping those in need is still at the heart of Christmas.





Then there is St Lucy/Santa Lucia (13 Dec), beloved of Scandinavians...again for helping those in need.

Perhaps not so well known is St. Stephen (26 Dec) who is known from Scripture as the first martyr...an example of ultimate faith!



St. John, the Evangelist rounds out December on the 27th. He is credited with the gospel bearing his name and the Book of Revelation. Tradition also records him as caring for Mary, the mother of Our Lord, for the rest of her life, suffering a number of persecutions and imprisonments, but still living to an old age, with Revelations being perhaps his last great work.





On January 4th we have St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, a 19th century saint and the first native-born American to be canonized. A convert to the Roman faith, she established the first Catholic school in the nation, at Emmitsburg, Maryland, where she also founded the first American congregation of religious sisters, the Sisters of Charity. Her work was the beginning of the parochial school system in the U.S.

We'll stop with just one final saint, St. Henry/Henrik/Heikki, Bishop of Uppsala, Sweden, missionary to Finland, where he died a martyr on 19 January 1156. He is the patron of Finland and of the national cathedral in Helsinki. You may have heard of Heikinpaiva, which is the celebration of St. Henry's Day in Hancock (and Finland) commemorating his death (originally) and acting as a symbolic mid-winter festival, and way to escape encroaching cabin fever!!



There....enough from the Library....guess who was an avid reference librarian?? Think about these sainted people as you move through the winter months. Look them up online and become informed about them; they were truly exceptional folks and worthy of emulation as part of the great cloud of witnesses....OR....check out one of the Christmas or Epiphany books on display and delve into the beginnings of the road to salvation.

Hanging of the Greens Saturday, December 13 @ 10:00 a.m.


Bethany will celebrate the beautifying of our sanctuary for the Christmas season with a special gathering on Saturday,

Lessons and Carola





An Epiphany service of Lessons and Carols will be held on Tuesday, January 6, at 6:30 pm.

The church season of Epiphany begins on January 6 each year. The name comes from the Greek word *epiphaneia*, meaning "to appear, to show or to manifest." The ending date of the Epiphany season is determined by Ash Wednesday, which is determined by the date of Easter.

Traditionally, Epiphany Day marks the arrival of the Magi, or wise men, to worship the infant Jesus. The significance of Epiphany for Christians is that it symbolizes the first recognition of Christ by Gentiles, or non-Jews.

The season of Epiphany emphasizes the divine nature of Jesus, the light of the world. Symbols for the season include light, a star and the color green, which represents life, growth, hope and eternity


Congratulations Sara and Alex
