

PASTOR'S REFLECTIONS

June 7th is the 15th anniversary of my ordination. I was ordained on the evening of June 7th, 1996 at Notre Dame Catholic Church in Southbridge, Massachusetts as part of the opening worship at the New England Synod Assembly that year. (It was at a Catholic church

because there aren't many Lutheran churches in New England large enough to hold such gatherings). I can't think about that night without thinking about my father and that is perhaps appropriate in this month that we celebrate Father's Day. What I think about is how proud he was that night.



In a way it's funny, because about four and a half years before that I remember asking him when I was home for Christmas, "Would you think I was crazy if I told you I was thinking about going to seminary?" and without a bit of hesitation he answered, "Yes." Mind you, he was a

churchman's churchman, always in worship, active on the Church Council and other committees pretty much his whole adult life so this wasn't an anti-church thing; he was a very faithful man. But he was of a generation that had trouble understanding giving up the security of a seventeen year teaching career for what was essentially a big unknown.

As part of our conversation that day, he also asked me a really good question. My father was not a big talker, but he was the type, when he said something, it was usually worth paying attention to. If he had more to say it was more likely to be in written form in a letter where he could measure his words more carefully. (I remember my brother saying to me once, "You mean you get those letters too?") Anyway, he asked me, "How do you know you're not already doing what God wants you to do?" It was a good question. It wasn't an effort to talk me in or out of anything, just a question for me to think about.

Once I made the final decision to go to seminary, he couldn't have been more supportive as he always was in whatever I did. My mother was more of the nurturer, but I never had any doubt that my father would be there for me and would support and encourage me in whatever ways he could. It made him feel better when I said Kathy and I were getting married because he thought for me to do this all alone would have been tough and he was right. On the warm June night of my ordination though, I know that among the several hundred people gathered in that big church there was no one prouder of me than he was.

My father died quite suddenly eleven years ago in May of 2000 just a couple of months after I had begun my call back in Massachusetts. The last memory I have of him he was fixing the broken leg of our coffee table. It's quite fitting, as he was always fixing something for me.

At seminary, when we talked about the church year in worship classes, days like Mother's Day and Father's Day were pretty much dismissed as Hallmark holidays, not to be bothered much with in church. It's true that they are not liturgical holidays, but in my case and I hope yours too, they are an opportunity to honor and give thanks for blessings of love that we have received.

And then you

We arrange our lives as best we can,

to keep your holiness at bay,

with our pieties,

our doctrines,

our liturgies,

our moralities,

our secret ideologies,

Safe, virtuous, settled.

And then you -

you and your dreams,

you and your visions,

you and your purposes,

you and your commands,

you and our neighbors,

We find your holiness not at bay;

but probing, pervading,

insisting, demanding.

And we yield, sometimes gladly,

sometimes resentfully,

sometimes late...or soon.

We yield because you, beyond us, are our God.

We are your creatures met by your holiness,

by your holiness made our true selves.

And we yield. Amen.

Walking Together at the 2011 NGLS Assembly By Ann Gonyea

The word "synod" comes from the roots "syn" meaning together and the Greek word "hodos," which means a way or a journey, but also can be used as a traveling metaphor for a course of conduct, a manner of thinking or feeling or deciding. And so it was appropriate that the theme of the 2011 Northern Great Lakes Synod Assembly was "Walking Together." And the origins of the word, as shared in a synod assembly bible study by Delaware-Maryland Synod Bishop Wolfgang Herz-Lane, was a good reminder that "Walking Together" wasn't just a theme for an annual meeting. It is the natural state of being part of a group like the Northern Great Lakes Synod of the ELCA.



A lot of business and conversation was undertaken by the 240 or so people gathered for the assembly. Representing Bethany were Pastor Warren Geier, council president Tom Ryan, and me. Those gathered deliberated and made decisions on who the bishop would be for the next six years, filled a handful of other synod committee vacancies and considered a number of resolutions. Through all of this, the common message was not only that we walk together, but also that we do so in order to fulfill God's will.

"The challenge for us is not walking together, but who God is calling us to walk with," said Pastor Rafael Malpica Padilla, executive director of the ELCA World Mission, in his keynote speech. Malpica Padilla was there representing the churchwide office of the ELCA and ELCA Global Mission. He also oversaw the election of bishop. "Most often we choose to walk with people who are just like us," he added. Malpica Padilla used the story of Jonah to illustrate his point. Jonah was called by God to go on a mission trip, but when he found out God had Ninevah in mind, Jonah did everything he could to exercise his own will to be with the people of Tarshish, the people he chose for his mission. After ending up in the belly of a fish and spit out at Ninevah anyway, he still railed against God's will and delivered what Malpica Padilla called "the worst sermon in homiletic history ... 'In 40 days, you are all going to hell." Jonah's sermon worked: The people responded and repented and God had a change of heart and decided not to blot out the people of Ninevah. How did Jonah react to the success of his mission trip? His efforts to walk together with others to facilitate God's will? He got really mad. Malpica Padilla challenged those in the assembly audience: "Jonah decided Ninevah didn't deserve it. So when do we decide who deserves it?"

The process of electing the bishop culminated with the re-election of Bishop Thomas Skrenes on the fourth ballot, but not before a handful of candidates had the opportunity to talk about the office, how they would fill it and how the office of bishop does and can support congregations. Our own Pastor Geier, along with Pastor Pete Warmenen, were also in the running until the fourth ballot. Warmenen is Pastor of St. Paul's in Medford, Wis., and the program director at Fortune Lake Lutheran Camp. Other bishop candidates who made it to the third ballot and had the opportunity to address the assembly included Pastor Lee Goodwin, executive director of the NGLS Sabbath Project and interim pastor of Bethel Lutheran in Menominee; and Pastor Kim Beckman, interim pastor of Faith Lutheran in Brookfield, Ill. The third ballot also included two candidates who were not present: Pastor David Echelbarger from Mt. Pleasant Lutheran in Racine, Wis., and Pastor Tari Stage-Harvey from Shepherd of the Valley in Juneau, Alaska.

Resolutions considered by the assembly included:

Clergy Compensation Guidelines for 2012: approved

An amended fiscal year 2011 budget in the amount of \$1.4 million: approved

A budget for fiscal year 2010 in the amount of \$1.37 million: approved

A resolution calling for the church to speak and act to prevent bullying, harassment and related violence: approved

A resolution on bound conscience and concerning a pastor's and congregation's ability to pass bylaws regarding calling pastors and performing weddings: defeated

A resolution on the Trinitarian name of God Father, Son and Holy Spirit: defeated A resolution on welcoming "traditional" Lutherans: referred to Synod Council

In the cases in which resolutions were defeated or referred to Synod Council, the majority of recommendations to defeat centered on understandings that the issues were already provided for by the ELCA, NGLS or in individual parish bylaws.



Several other presentations were made during the course of the assembly gathering. Pastor Geier was asked to tell about Bethany's WLUC TV6 commercial spots inviting people to worship. He talked about the reasons Bethany wanted to try the approach and showed the three commercials that have been running on TV6 since last fall.

Pastor Jim Deuhring from Prince of Peace in Harvey and synod statistician shared some of the demographic information he's gathered from NGLS congregations. Among other things, he reported 191 people transferred into the synod, 36 congregations say community service is a significant part of the ministry they provide and 11 congregations reported that spiritual development is a priority.

Lon Buss from Lutheran Men in Mission and Catherine Sanborn from WELCA reported on upcoming events and efforts being undertaken in those organizations.

Pastor Malpica Padilla also delivered a message from the churchwide organization. He said the theme for the upcoming year was "God's mission of restoring community" and based in part on Galatians 5:13: "For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another."

"I come to you not with a list of accomplishments of the last year, or the lack thereof," Malpica-Padilla told assembly participants. "I come to you with an invitation: come let us rebuild."

Hear us, O God.
- Walk with us world citizens, Attentive God. Bless our leaders. Give them the courage and wisdom necessary to forge ahead into a time of healing, conversation and understanding in our world. Be with our brothers and sisters called to serve our country in the military and bring them home safe and whole. Give us strength to bear witness to all the world as people of God to do justice, love kindness and walk humbly. Thomas Skrenes Re-elected Bishop of ELCA Northern Great Lakes Synod



CHICAGO (ELCA) -- The Rev. Thomas A. Skrenes was elected to a third six-year term as bishop of the Northern Great Lakes Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Skrenes, 56, was re-elected May 14 on the fourth ballot for bishop at the synod assembly in Marquette, Mich.

"Our calling to reach out with the good news of Jesus Christ to the lost and lonely does not stop, even when economic problems or internal dissensions afflict and distract us," he said to the assembly after he was re-elected. "We walk towards the cross of Jesus even if we are wounded and hurting. We walk together as sinners in the arms of a loving God. Christ is still risen."

Skrenes received 147 votes on the fourth ballot. Others who received votes on the fourth ballot were the Rev. Warren L. Geier, 52 votes, and the Rev. Peter M. Warmanen, 29 votes. Geier is pastor of Bethany Lutheran Church, Ishpeming, Mich. Warmanen is pastor of St. Paul Lutheran Church, Medford, Wis., and program director, Fortune Lake Lutheran Camp, Crystal Falls, Mich. There were 26 names on the first, or nominating, ballot.

Skrenes' new term begins Sept. 1. He was first elected bishop in 1999, succeeding the Rev. Dale R. Skogman, who served two terms as bishop. Before he became bishop, Skrenes served six years as assistant to the bishop on Skogman's staff and was pastor for more than 12 years at Trinity Lutheran Church, Ishpeming.

Skrenes and his wife, Luanne, reside in Ishpeming and are parents of four grown sons.

The ELCA Northern Great Lakes Synod includes about 32,000 baptized members in 85 congregations across the Upper Peninsula of Michigan and six counties in north-eastern Wisconsin. The synod office is in Marquette.

She has studied with several noted organists, including Robert Anderson, Robert Baker, Dale Peters, Guy Bovet, and Jean Langlais.

She has been awarded teaching fellowships in organ and theory at Southern Methodist University and at North Texas State University, and is a member of Pi Kappa Lambda, the honorary music society. Her past teaching experience includes teaching organ and theory at San Jacinto College in Pasadena, Texas and teaching organ at Eastfield and Dallas. Currently she teaches organ at Eastfield and Richland Colleges in Dallas, Texas and is organist at Park Cities Baptist Church.

For many years Christina Harmon has given concerts in churches in the United States and in Europe. Other accomplishments include directing an organ study program in France for the last six years and serving as Chariman of the Board for the Dallas Philosphers' Forum. In addition, she is a composer and has many published compositions to her credit.

May 23, 2011 **Tornado in Joplin, Missouri**

Borg, Marcus J. Putting Away Childish Things; a tale of modern faith.




Kingsbury, Karen. Just Beyond the Clouds.
